## Spring 2022

#### Since I took office, we have been working hard to re-establish East Windsor as a business-friendly community. This was most clearly demonstrated through the ERASE Grant, a program intended to assist small businesses and nonprofits in the community through direct payment grants. I've also tried to interact in a meaningful way with one business or nonprofit per week through personal visits and highlighting those entities in subsequent posts on our social media and web pages.

These initiatives demonstrated that we appreciate and support entities doing business in our town. Our local economy supports our local tax base, which helps us keep our taxes reasonable as we maintain necessary services in the community.

East Windsor is ideally suited for future economic expansion given its proximity to Hartford and Springfield, the heart of New England's Knowledge Corridor. We are equidistant to New York City and Boston, have two highway exits and we are less than ten minutes from an international airport. The ingredients are here for meaningful development and economic growth.

To foster that growth, over the last few months we have hosted Metro Hartford Alliance and AdvanceCT (two regional economic development partners) on driving tours through East Windsor to showcase more than fifty potentially developable or redevelopable properties predominantly along the Route 5 and Route 140 corridors. We have also incorporated those parcels into the Town's Developable Properties List located on the Town website. We have had encouraging conversations with businesses looking for site locations because of these collaborations with the Alliance and AdvanceCT.

We are continuing to look for ways to make our community more attractive to prospective businesses. In recent years, the Town has started using tax abatements as an economic development tool. Through conversations with economic development professionals, we know that tax abatements help finish discussions around new development, but they do not start those conversations. What we do hear repeatedly is that businesses are looking for someplace where they can build quickly.

To increase the speed of the permitting process while still ensuring we are meeting our statutory and regulatory requirements, we are trying to identify property owners who own property that could be developed in concert with the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development. We will then run those developable parcels through the zoning and wetlands processes on a

## **Groundwater Protection**


ave you ever stopped to think, when you turn on your faucet, where the water comes from? How do you know it is safe to drink? If you have your own well you are likely very aware that the water you drink, bathe in, cook and clean with comes from the ground. The same is true for most public water sources.

Groundwater is just that, water that is stored beneath the ground in the void spaces in soil and bedrock fractures. It flows at varying rates dictated by the type of substrate (soil, sand, gravel, rock, etc.) through which it travels. The easier the flow the higher the yield a well will generate.

Groundwater feeds our rivers, streams, ponds, and our wells. It is out of sight and can be out of mind. Therefore, it's important to consider that groundwater is replenished locally by rain and snow that seeps into the ground. This leaves the quality of our groundwater susceptible to contamination caused by mismanagement of certain activities and land uses involving hazards materials.

The State of Connecticut has put in place regulations for the protection of groundwater aquifers that are being used for public water supplies or are suitable for future use. Towns that have such resources are required to protect them through local regulation. In East Windsor, the Hunt Aquifer, located in Broad Brook Village, is a resource for private and public water supply wells. The boundaries of this aquifer have been mapped and adopted as an Aquifer Protection Area.

## **Snowfall Maintenance Reminders**

#### Parking



Residents are reminded that the Ordinance to Regulate General Parking in the Town of East Windsor prohibits street parking during and after any period of snowfall or icy condition in order that the Depart-

ment of Public Works will be able to safely and efficiently remove the hazards of snow and ice from the roads.

#### **Snow Removal from Sidewalks**



The Sidewalk Ordinance Regarding Snow & Ice Removal requires the owner, tenant, occupant, or person having the care, maintenance or rental of the land, building or premises adjoining or front-

ing upon a sidewalk to remove snow, sleet or ice within 24 hours following the cessation of the fall of snow or sleet. Failure to do so could result in a fine.

#### **Snow Removal from Fire Hydrants**



Residents are asked to clear any snow from fire hydrants on your property or nearby. Open a path to the hydrant and clear an area of at least 2 to 3 feet around the hydrant for easy access in case of an emergency.

#### **Your Mailbox**



Residents are reminded to make sure their mailboxes are secured and sturdy before the winter begins. Mailboxes that are damaged by the snow load will not be repaired by the Town. Please see Policy Concerning Mailboxes and Mailbox Damage Form. If you have



## The Town of East Windsor Begins the 2022 Revaluation

The Town of East Windsor has selected Vision Government Solutions to assist with the statutorily mandated 2022 revaluation project. Vision's Appraisal division will be working closely with the Assessing Department to make the process successful for the Town.

Connecticut state law requires towns to revalue every five years. A revaluation will determine the fair market value of every property in town and equalizes the values of all properties for the purpose of a fair distribution of the tax burden.

The major phases of a municipal revaluation are:

- Data Collection
- Market Analysis
- Valuation
- Field Review
- Informal Hearings

#### **Beginning Phase 1 of the Revaluation**

Data Collection began in November. Vision personnel will proceed with

exterior data collection of all commercial properties, as well as properties which have sold, and current open permits. This data collection is critical, as it enables us to ensure accurate measurements both on main structures and outbuildings and to visually verify exterior characteristics of the property and condition. This is the most time-intensive phase of the project, but the most critical for data accuracy and integrity.

The Town of East Windsor continues to actively monitor the evolving health situation regarding COVID-19 (coronavirus) and is deeply committed to the continued health and safety of our residents. This approach accomplishes the goal of ensuring the utmost safety of our residents and data collectors by aligning with the social distancing protocols that are recommended at a federal and state level.

To ensure continued accuracy in data, data collectors will physically inspect the <u>exterior only</u>, to verify the measurements of each building as needed. The data collector will note a building's size, condition, quality of construction, improvements, topography, utilities, and numerous other characteristics. At this time, data collectors will not enter any structure, but will ask for information at your door. All data collectors will be wearing reflective clothing, carry an identification badge and a letter of introduction, have an "Assessor's Office" sign posted in the vehicle window, and their cars will be registered with the Police as well as the Assessor's and First Selectman's Offices in the Town Hall.

## WATER POLLUTION CONTROL FACILITY

The staff of the East Windsor WPCF have been busy since the fall. Our project with Eversource and Evercore is wrapping up. Over 300 lighting fixtures were replaced with new energy efficient LED lighting. Lighting is now able to be controlled wirelessly, allowing staff to control when certain lighting is on or off. In addition, we can control the intensity of the lighting. Mini split heating / air conditioning units were installed in three locations within the facility. Thirteen Variable Frequency Drives were replaced as part of this project. The pump replacement project we completed at the Mill Street pump station has worked out very well. We recently ordered an



additional pump for the Mill Street station and ordered two complete pump assemblies for the Scantic Road pump station.

Staff recently completed a long-awaited replacement of the diffusers in the thickened sludge storage tank. This project had been delayed due to safety concerns with staff working 25 feet down in a storage tank. We were able to perform the work following Confined Space Entry protocol and were successful in upgrading the old diffusers with a much-improved system.

Staff also replaced the access hatch into the thickened sludge tank as part of the diffuser replacement project as access is only able though the hatch. Again, what appeared to be an almost impossible task was completed by staff. This required some creative welding and fabrication by WPCF staff.


Work has continued with the replacement of the pinch valves for the isolation of tankage and pumps. This work involves maneuvering large, bulky 650-pound valves into very tight areas. Staff continues to plug away on the valve replacements as time permits. We typically change over many of the processes during the spring and fall so we were able to complete all the maintenance and repairs this fall.

The Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection recently transferred responsibility for the General Permit for Miscellaneous Industrial Users (GP MIU) to the individual Water Pollution Control Facilities. While many WPCA's imposed fees for re-

cord keeping and inspections the East Windsor Water Pollution Control Authority has decided not to impose any fees associated with this program. This program requires registration and annual inspection for oil water separators. Existing staff will take on these additional responsibilities and duties.

We have seen an uptick in sewer inspections for new sewer connections. This has been a pleasant surprise. We have seen a number of new connections along North Road/Bassdale Plaza and just finished the installation of sanitary sewer lines for the rear building and the adjacent pad site. The Noble Gas station is planning to build a car wash to the east of the gas station. This will connect to the sanitary sewer as well. We have also seen a number of residences connect to the North Road sewer as well.

#### **VITALS INFORMATION**

A Connecticut birth certificate is available from the Town Clerk of the hospital town & in the town in which the child's mother was living at the time. Birth certificates from 2003-present are on a statewide database which allows you to go to any town to get a certified copy. If you are living in town and need your child's birth certificate but you moved from a different town, we will be able to help you in the office here!

A Connecticut death certificate is available certified from the Town Clerk of the town in which the death occurred and in the town in which the individual resided at the time of death.

A Connecticut marriage certificate is available from the Town Clerk of the town in which the marriage occurred and the in the town in which the individuals resided in at the time of marriage.

All vital records requests must be made in person or by postal mail. The cost of a certified copy is \$20.00. The Town Clerk accepts cash or check.

New activities proposed within the boundaries of the Aquifer Protection Area must be reviewed by the Aquifer Protection Agency. Members of the East Windsor Planning and Zoning Commission serve on the Aquifer Protection Agency. The regulations restrict development of certain new land use activities that use, store, handle or dispose of hazardous materials. Existing regulated land uses are required to register and follow best management practices.

Clean and plentiful groundwater is important for our quality of life. Below are some preventative measures you can take at home to protect groundwater quality.

- Dispose of waste properly, don't dump chemicals down the drain or on the ground
- Maintain your septic system (pumping and inspections)
- Safely store hazardous chemicals and fuels to prevent spills and leaks
- Always follow directions when applying fertilizers or pesticides
- Have underground fuel oil tanks tested for leaks

Licenses may be obtained in person, or by mail. Per Connecticut General

Statutes 22-338(b) and 22-338, you must provide us with a current valid rabies certificate and a spay/neuter certificate (if applicable).

If you want to license your dog through the mail, please mail the following items to: Town Clerk, 11 Rye St., Broad Brook, CT 06016.

- 1. Check made out to: "Town of East Windsor" for the applicable fee.
- 2. Late fees included in check (if applicable).
- 3. Current valid rabies certificate.
- 4. Spay/Neuter certificate (if applicable).
- 5. Self-addressed stamped envelope for the return of the dog license, dog tag, rabies certificate and spay/neuter certificate.

The Town Clerk's office hours are Mon.-Wed. 8:30-4:30, Thurs. 8:30-7:00 and Fri. 8:30-1:00. For more information about dog licenses, call the Town Clerk's Office at (860) 292-8255.
