Elderly And Disabled Homeowner Benefit Deadline

The Assessor reminds any residents eligible for homeowner benefits that the deadline to apply is **May 15th**. Eligibility is determined by age (over 65 years old) or the existence of a permanent disability and income.

The maximum income limit for a single person is \$43,800 and for a married couple it is \$53,400. If an income tax return has been filed with the IRS, a copy must be presented at the time of application, along with statements of any untaxable income such as Social Security or Railroad Retirement payments. If an income tax return is not filed, statements of all income must be presented. These include statements of wages, lottery winnings, taxable pensions, IRA's, interest, dividends, rental income, Social Security earnings, Railroad Retirement, veteran's payments, etc.

This is a two-year program, with refile applications, as well as new applications, due between February 1st and May 15th each year. Existing applicants due to refile this year have been notified. We will also be accepting Veteran's, blind and totally disabled applications.

A new local option program was enacted in 2023 allowing eligible applicants an additional \$250 off their tax bill, in addition to the State program.

Board Of Assessment Appeals Deadline

The Board of Assessment appeals will be meeting in the month of March, if the Grand List is filed by January 31st and will meet in April if the Grand List is filed by February 28th. Appeal applications are available online on the Town website, under the Assessor's page. Applications for a hearing with the Board must be submitted in writing at 11 Rye Street in Broad Brook, CT 06016. Applications for the hearings in March must be received by February 20th and for hearings in April, by March 20th. Please call the Assessor's Office to determine which date will be in effect. **A POSTMARK DATE IS NOT CON-SIDERED TIMELY;** the application must be in the Assessor's office by the deadline date. Please contact the Assessor's Office with any questions.

Tax Department

The Tax Department has just completed the second installment of the real estate, personal property taxes, and motor vehicle supplemental taxes, due each year in January.

Under state law, the Town is also required to collect delinquencies on back due taxes. We are now preparing the required delinquent statements for mailing, and preparing motor vehicle accounts to be sent to the collection agency. Certain delinquent real estate accounts that meet the criteria have already been sent to the attorney for tax sale. In the next couple of months, we will begin the process of placing liens on real estate and businesses.

We understand and acknowledge that the process for collecting back taxes can be an unpleasant one. As always, we stand ready to provide any assistance to taxpayers who may be interested in resolving any delinquency issues ahead of the commencement of the moral formal process.

Tax Department staff will progress with our continuing education and legislative updates over the next couple of months.

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First Selectman

Recently, the Town hosted United States Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) and State Representative Jaime Foster for what could be a last of its kind event – a ceremony to award a Purple Heart to a World War I veteran.

The honoree, Anthony Boutanis, received the award posthumously for his service in the Great War, where he sustained multiple injuries in the line of duty and during a time when emergency medical care on the field of battle was virtually nonexistent, severely complicating care for the wounded.

Private Boutanis returned home and lived out his days in the Warehouse Point Village, working on the farm where Geissler's Supermarket is now located. Private Boutanis is fondly remembered by some in town, but his service and sacrifice have gone unrecognized.

Although he was injured in combat, Private Boutanis was not awarded his Purple Heart because a fire destroyed his military records housed by the U.S. Army. As a result, his service went uncelebrated. That is, until his grandson, Joe Janesczko, also of Warehouse Point, became an advocate for his grandfather. Working with family



and friends, Mr. Janesczko was able to provide authenticating documentation to Senator Blumenthal's office, who worked with the Department of the Army to recognize Private Boutanis' injuries – more than one hundred years after the end of World War I.

We're grateful to Mr. Janesczko and to

Senator Blumenthal for making this recognition possible. It is an honor that the potentially last Purple Heart presented to a World War I veteran was to a resident of East Windsor.

Spotlight on The East Windsor Public Schools Teacher Residency Program

Innovative program bringing new talent to the classrooms

few years ago, Sophia Sundar Raj approached Broad Brook Principal Laura Foxx curious to know how she could transition from tutor to teacher at the school.

Ms. Foxx had just come from a meeting with Superintendent Patrick Tudryn where the two had discussed the possibility of participating in a new program, the Teacher in Residency Program.

"I encouraged Sophia to apply in the hope she could complete her residency here at Broad Brook," Ms. Foxx said. "The superintendent met with teachers who were qualified to be mentors to determine their interest. Michelle Wylie expressed interest and once she learned she would be working with Sophia, she was excited to help her reach her goal."

The Teacher Residency program is rigorous: Candidates complete a year of teaching under their mentor's direct supervision and guidance. In order to gain teacher certification, they must also complete state mandated assessments, coursework, and a portfolio-based assessment.

"I like the program for its rigor and the fact that it gives the resident teachers a complete year to gain 'student -teaching' experience, working beside a mentor teacher," Ms. Sundar Raj said. "The 'no cost' tuition for the program since the district sponsors the resident, is an added benefit."

More importantly, the program is designed to help diversify the teacher ranks. Nationally, statewide, and in East Windsor, the teacher workforce does not reflect the student population. According to a report in Kappan - a news site dedicated to K-12 educational research, practice, and policy - the number of people graduating from traditional teacher preparation programs has been steadily declining.

"National Center for Education Statistics (NCES, 2021) data indicate that the number of students graduating from college with bachelor's degrees in education shrank from 176,307 graduates in 1970-71 to 85,058 in 2019-20. At the same time, the teacher workforce is significantly less diverse than the population of students attending public schools. In the 2020-21 school year, about 80% of U.S. K-12 public school teachers were non-Hispanic white, while the number of white students in public schools is less than 47%. In Connecticut, that disparity is even starker, as nearly 90% of teachers are white and more than 51% of students identify as people of color," Kappan reported.

Ms. Wylie, who was East Windsor Public Schools Teacher of the Year in 2023-24, says all schools need to build and grow a staff that is reflective of the community's diverse population. "It is important for students to see themselves in the people standing in front of them in the classroom," Mrs. Wylie said. "We have so many kids from different backgrounds and cultures, I think it is important that our teaching staff be reflective of our com-

munity."

School officials say the program, now in its second year in East Windsor, is also a great way for people interested in a career change. It's particularly useful to those looking to be a teacher but want an alternative pathway, rather than a traditional college program, to pursue their dream.

Ms. Sundar Raj's first career was as an associate professor teaching applied electronics to graduate students. She left to raise two children, and eight years later, she wanted to focus her next job on something that would suit her at this point in her life.

"I wanted something that would resonate with my values, something which is both interesting and rewarding at the same time, and also something which I am good at," she said. "I chose teaching as a profession because I love the impact one can have on individual children, especially here at the elementary level."

Ms. Sundar Raj is now completing her second year in third grade. "She is teaching on her own and has the support of a sponsor teacher, who is the grade level team leader," Ms. Foxx said. "Sophia is doing well as a beginning teacher. The rigor of the program helped prepare her for her new role. We look forward to her continued growth."

Superintendent Tudryn said the program is extremely beneficial for the district.

"Number one, people in our community have a viable opportunity to earn teacher certification and be part of their own community's school system. Number two, our teachers who serve as mentors develop their own coaching and leadership skills. And number three, we as an organization are able to develop internally viable teaching candidates for our open positions."

The Planning and Zoning Commission to Begin Revisions to the Plan of Conservation and Development

very 10 years the Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) is required by state statute to revisit the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) to assess the current state of the Town; refresh our vision for the future and to map out goals and actions necessary to attain that vision. All of which will be documented in a revised Plan of Conservation and Development.

What is the Plan of Conservation and Development?

The Town's POCD is an advisory document which serves as a planning tool for the future of the Town. It is essentially a road map to our future growth and prescribes goals and actions for the next ten years and beyond. The POCD offers guidance for the overall conservation, preservation and growth of our Town. It covers many focus areas including economic development, natural resource protection, transportation, infrastructure, housing development, sustainability, and resiliency. All of which supports our vision for the future.

Our current vision for the future has three pillars that address the character of East Windsor, guiding development, and economic growth. Below is the overall vision for East Windsor's future as presented in the 2016 POCD.

- The rural, village, agricultural and business character that define East Windsor must be preserved to keep the Town an attractive place to live, work, and play.
- Residential and village area devel opment must be carefully guided to ensure compatibility with community character and allow East Windsor to prepare for the impacts of future growth and an aging population.
- Economic development must be retained and expanded to support the

community with services, jobs, and taxes, while remaining sensitive to the community's environment and quality of life.

Seeking Your Input

To ensure this guidance document reflects the consensus of our citizens and those who do business in town, the Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) will be seeking input from the residents and businesses during this review and revision process. The Commission will collect your opinions and thoughts through a community survey and public workshops to be held during PZC meetings as they address the results of the community survey, issues facing the Town, and necessary revisions to the POCD.

A POCD webpage will allow for easy access to information, linking to the community survey, and tracking revision progress.

ebruary is American Heart Month. The goal of American Heart Month is to promote awareness and prevention of heart disease, the leading cause of death in the United States. Every 34 seconds someone dies of heart disease in the United States, and it continues to grow as a public health issue nationally.
