In June, the Town of East Windsor launched the second annual Small Business Passport Program, which runs through the end of August. The process is simple: program participants pick up a passport, and make purchases at participating businesses. Based on purchases made, businesses will award stickers to the customers. Anyone who, at the end of the program, has collected at least 28 stickers is eligible for a cash prize drawing.

This year, nineteen local businesses are participating, including 11 returning businesses from last year's program. The purpose of this initiative is for the Town of East Windsor to encourage consumer dollars to be spent locally and support small businesses, which in turn support our local tax base. And, customers may find a local hidden gem along the way! This is a win-win for everyone.

We understand the significant role small businesses play in our town. In addition to supporting our tax base, these small busi-

nesses often support youth sports, civic activities, school groups and more throughout our community. They are often the first ones to be asked to buy an ad or make a donation. This passport program serves as an opportunity to show them our support.

Small businesses also serve as a significant source of employment in our community. Last year, Southern Auto Auction celebrated their seventy-fifth anniversary – all of them in East Windsor. This year, Geissler's Supermarket is celebrating its one-hundredth anniversary, starting in East Windsor and spreading to seven towns in two states. These businesses are two of East Windsor's largest employers, providing our residents with careers to support their families, not just jobs.

Beyond their success in their respective businesses, Southern Auto Auction's Garrison Hudkins is the third leader of the company to also lead their national trade association; Robert Rybick has been active

in state and national grocer's organizations. Not only have they been successes in their businesses, but they've been recognized as leaders in their industries.

These decades-long success stories only happen through the dedicated commitment of generations of families, smart business sense, high-quality products, and most importantly, support from our community. That is what we seek to encourage through the passport program – instilling that community support that will bolster new and growing businesses like East River Massage, The Agonist Gallery, Two Sisters' Nutrition, or any of the other participating businesses for years – or generations – to come.

So, grab your passports at any participating business or in Town Hall, and get shopping! Together, East Windsor's best days are ahead!

Finance Office

On April 4th the Voters approved the Renovation and Expansion of the Scout Hall Building at 28 Abbe Road into a Community Center for \$4,720,000 which included the Acceptance of a \$2,750,000 Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) Award administered by USDA and \$924,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. We are working with the USDA to get this project underway. This project was approved with 71% in favor.

At the May 9th Budget Referendum, the voters approved the FY 2023-24 Budget that will begin July 1, 2023. The budget was approved with 80% support.

At the June 1st Town Meeting voters approved allocations of \$900,000 in ARPA funds to the following projects:

Osborne Field/Volunteer Park Improvements	\$500,000
Senior Center Replacement Bus	\$150,000
EWHS Track/Tennis Court Engineering	\$120,000
Generator Replacements (3)	\$150,000

Five other projects were approved on June 28th by the voters:

Walking Trail Equipment/Materials	\$112,000
Global Model M4 High Side Dump Sweeper	\$349,618
Infrared Cameras (Fire Services – 16)	\$20,800
BMX Skate Park Improvements	\$10,000
Sidewalk Improvements	\$16,976



This will allocate the remaining American Rescue Plan Act funds available to East Windsor.

The Town portion of the FY 22-23 General Fund Budget finished under budget, returning approximately \$400,000 back to the General Fund at the end of the fiscal year.

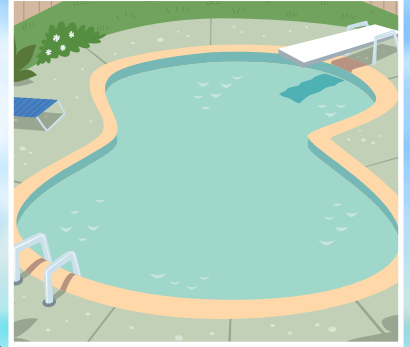

Building Department

Summer 2023

Summer is in full swing making this a good time for some swimming pool safety reminders. Did you know that according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, drowning is the leading cause of unintentional deaths in children ages 1-4?! A statistic that no one wants to hear but highlights the importance of pool safety.



Here are some safety tips to keep your family safe this pool season:

1. Never leave a child unattended in or near water.
2. Teach your child to stay away from pool drains and ensure that all pools and spas you visit have code compliant drain covers.
3. Install proper barriers, covers and alarms on and around your pool or spa.

The following code excerpts were created with the safety of you and your family in mind. They create a minimum safety requirement for all pools deeper than 24 inches.

The 2021 International Swimming Pool and Spa Code with the 2022 Connecticut State Amendments require a barrier not less than 48 inches above grade be installed around outdoor pools and spas, and openings in the barrier shall not allow passage of a 4-inch-diameter sphere. All gates shall be self-closing and self-latching, and a pool alarm must be installed.

Safety is our top priority here in the Building Department. If you have any questions or concerns regarding the Codes, call our office at 860-623-2439. We wish you a happy and safe summer!

Girls on the Run Comes to East Windsor

This is past Spring, East Windsor Parks & Recreation collaborated with East Windsor Middle School and the East Windsor Youth Service Bureau to bring the nationwide Girls on the Run Program to fruition in our community. Girls on the Run is a nonprofit that “inspires girls to be joyful, healthy and confident using a fun, experienced-based curriculum.”

East Windsor participated in the Heart & Sole Program, open to girls in grades 5-8. The Heart & Sole Program “considers the whole person - body, brain, heart, spirit, and social connection. Heart & Sole offers an inclusive place of belonging, where girls feel supported and inspired to explore their emotions, cultivate empathy, and strengthen their physical and emotional health.”

Participants met twice a week, over the course of 8 weeks after school at East Windsor Middle School. At the end of the program, the girls (along with supporters) participated in the Girls on the Run 5K, May 13th in Bloomfield, Connecticut. This was a culmination of all the work they had put in throughout the Spring, as well as a moment to celebrate their accomplishments both as a group and as an individual.

A huge thank you is in order for the EW Youth Service Bureau, who graciously funded this opportunity so that there was no cost to participants. Also, a shoutout and thank you to East Windsor Middle School Staff Holly Surrette and Jillian Ellefson for taking on coaching duties for the Spring 2023 Season and making this opportunity possible. We look forward to continuing this program in 2024, as well as growing the program in the future!

2022/2023 Energy Assistance Program

The 2022/2023 Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) once again had less restrictions for people to qualify, resulting in another busy energy season. As of May 31, 2023, we had 366 households apply and 344 were approved for help for their primary source of heat. Basic awards ranged from \$250 to \$600, while Crisis awards were \$430 with some households being eligible for up to four. The 344 households that were approved received Basic benefits of \$163,050 and Crisis benefits of \$211,560, totaling \$374,610.

The Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) was an addition to CEAP in the 2022/2023 heating season. LIHWAP provides one-time assistance of up to \$1,000 to households to restore services, prevent services from being disconnected and reduction of arrearage of drinking and wastewater bills. This program is made available to income eligible East Windsor residents for water and wastewater assistance because Connecticut Water (CWC) and Water Pollution Control Association (WPCA) became participating providers. Residents applying for LIHWAP must have already applied for CEAP and been approved. More than a dozen applications were submitted on behalf of qualified residents, and many were approved.

East Windsor Water Pollution Control Facility

The Staff of the East Windsor Water Pollution Control Facility is pleased to report that much work has been accomplished since the last edition of the Five Village Voice. Staff completed the installation of the second pump at the Scantic Pump Station. The complete rotating assembly was changed out with a new Sulzer Dry-Pit submersible pump along with new check valve and inlet and discharge valves. WPCF Staff performed the majority of the work with assistance from New England Pump and Valve (NEPV). This entire project took over a year to complete.

We are in the final stages of planning the pump replacements at the Route 140 pump

Station. Staff will be installing Sulzer submersible pumps along with new Variable Frequency Drives (VFD's). We are updating the remote telemetry at the North Road and Newberry Road Pump Stations.

Our sewer billing software vendor is retiring after many years of service to the WPCF. We are interviewing qualified vendors to provide this service going forward. The WPCA approved an operating budget of \$2,030,573.00 for Fiscal Year 2023 / 2024. The WPCA expects the current sewer user fee to remain at \$416.00. This is the second year that the rates have remained unchanged.

East Windsor Greater Together Community Funds Accepting Grant Applications

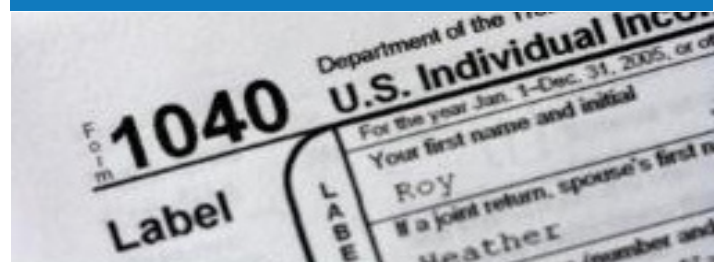

REVALUATION 2023 UPDATE



The Town's contracted revaluation company, **MUNICIPAL VALUATION SERVICES**, is ramping up its inspection phase for the 2023 revaluation. As part of the program to ensure continued accuracy in property information, data

collectors are inspecting properties that were purchased after October 1, 2022, to verify the measurements and characteristics of each structure. The data collector will note a building's size, condition, quality of construction, improvements, topography, utilities, and numerous other characteristics.

In addition to reviewing sale properties, the data collectors are also inspecting properties that have recently taken out building permits for various home improvement projects. Inspection of buildings that have been issued permits is an annual project of the Assessor's office; the only difference this year is that the inspectors will be revaluation employees, occasionally accompanied by an employee of the Assessor's office.

Data collectors will also call to schedule appointments for inspections.

All data collectors are wearing reflective clothing, carrying an identification badge and a letter of introduction, have an "Assessor's Office" sign posted in their vehicle window, and their cars are registered with the Police as well as the Assessor's and First Selectman's Offices in the Town Hall. Any questions regarding personnel may be directed to any of these Town offices.

New assessment values will be mailed to all property owners in mid-November as is commonly specified in the contract with the revaluation company.

This year, values are required to be determined by an analysis of the current real estate market by reviewing all sales that have occurred in the last year. In 2027, a full revaluation will be conducted. Assessors are mandated to physically inspect all properties in a town at least once every ten years. The 2027 revaluation will include a physical review of all properties using a questionnaire known as a data mailer that will be sent to all property owners listing their property information and asking that it be returned to the assessor's office with any adjustments. New construction and sale properties will be physically inspected.

Just in time for a reveal at CT Trails Day on June 3rd, A+C's collaboration with the American Heritage River Commission resulted in a beautiful, barred owl carving. In the fall, this realistic sculpture will be mounted to a tree at the Braille Trail adjacent to the Scantic River State Park.

Our very productive year included our first Arts and Culture Day on May 20th. Despite the rain, we had a great turnout! Participants were able to try samples of food from local restaurants, kids received a free Arts and Culture t-shirt to decorate, and three local musical groups performed. Several East Windsor artists had "make and take" sessions while others held live demonstrations and/or had vending booths at the event.

A collaborative community mural, "East Windsor has heART" was created and is displayed at the Town Hall Annex. It was truly an amazing event!

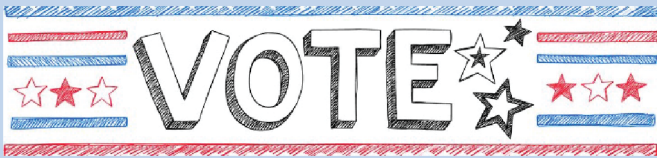
SENIOR SERVICES

Absentee Ballot Applications

If you would like to vote by absentee, you need to request an application for an absentee ballot. You can do that by either stopping in the office or calling with your name and address so that we can mail it to you.

Under Connecticut law, in order to vote by absentee ballot, a voter must be an active, registered voter (more on Connecticut's voter rolls can be found at myvote.ct.gov/voterolls) and have filled out an absentee ballot application. Absentee ballots are available for download online at myvote.ct.gov/absentee and at the Town Clerk's office.

Vitals Information

A Connecticut birth certificate is available from the Town Clerk of the hospital town & in the town in which the child's mother was living at the time. Birth certificates from 2003-present are on a statewide database which allows you to go to any town to get a certified copy. If you are living in town and need your child's birth certificate but you moved from a different town, we will be able to help you in the office here!

A Connecticut death certificate is available certified from the Town Clerk of the town in which the death occurred and in the town in which the individual resided at the time of death.

A Connecticut marriage certificate is available from the Town Clerk of the town in which the marriage occurred and the in the town in which the individuals resided at the time of marriage.
